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

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


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A COMPREHENSIVE SPIRITUAL GROWTH PLAN FOR STUDENTS

All loving parents desire that their children grow up to be responsible, mature adults with a solid foundation to live life well. Not only do we want our children to have "deep roots," we desire for them to be grounded for life: grounded for the duration of their life, as well as grounded to experience the abundant life offered through a personal relationship with

Jesus Christ. But how do we help students establish that kind of solid foundation in such a turbulent world?
We have a plan. Grounded for Life is Church at The Mill's comprehensive plan for developing graduates who are followers of Christ into college and beyond. The plan is centered on nine Biblical principles that we feel are essential for students

to learn and for graduates to have ingrained in their lives. These principles speak truth in three key areas:

IDENTITY, MATURITY, RESPONSIBILITY.

Everything we teach students in weekly programming and at camp/retreats is centered around instilling these principles in their hearts and minds for life.

"They are like trees planted along a riverbank, with roots that reach deep into the water. Such trees are not bothered by the heat or worried by long months of drought. Their leaves stay green, and they never stop producing fruit."

Our identity not only affects how we see ourselves, but also our entire worldview. An identity grounded in Jesus Christ is necessary to experience abundant life.

SALVATION

God loves you and wants a PERSONAL relationship with you.

THE GREATEST GIFT: THE SENIOR EXPERIENCE & THE PLAN

The culmination of the Grounded for Life plan for students is the Senior Experience, which serves as a final preparation and launching pad for life beyond high school. The greatest gift CATM can give graduates is a Senior Experience that grounds them in their faith and produces an individualized plan to help them experience God's best in college and beyond.

At Church at The Mill, the culmination of our comprehensive spiritual growth plan for students (called Grounded for Life) is the Senior Experience. The Senior Experience serves as a final preparation and launching pad for life beyond high school. Through a co-ed Senior Small Group experience, students begin the first semester studying Revelation (its themes and promises are so appropriate for students preparing for an unknown future) and a student version of Financial Peace University (we get the most positive feedback from parents on this).

In their final semester of Small Group. students are led to write a practical and actual plan for how to succeed beyond high school. We've learned that most students don't plan to fail; most just don't plan not to. That is why we lead them in writing a plan that is based on our nine Grounded for Life biblical principles.

THE PLAN

Each student is given a customized Senior Experience journal where students take notes as each biblical principle is taught and Scripture is discussed in smaller groups. Young Adults are invited in to share their post-graduation experience and suggest practical steps to implement the principles in ways that will benefit their life beyond high school. Students develop personal action steps for each biblical principle identified in The Plan, and together as a group the students decide on the most practical and helpful action steps for each principle. At the end of the semester, we take their action steps and have them professionally printed into each class' unique version of The Plan as a physical reminder to carry with them into their next stage of life. We encourage students to keep The Plan somewhere they will see it often and review the wisdom and ideas they took time to craft into their plan.

THE FIVE

Before students graduate, we also encourage them to identify a circle of five people that can hold them accountable to their plan during their first year of college. A number of studies have shown that students who have accountable relationships with 3-5 adults while in college are significantly more

successful at thriving spiritually than those who do not. We suggest their "5" include a parent (or two), a senior adult, a past or current mentor (Small Group leaders), as well as a peer that they admire spiritually. These 5 have the ability to greatly impact and encourage a student's successful transition to college. We connect these "5" to the student and the plan at a special celebration.

THE CELEBRATION

Another way we celebrate this period of transition is by making a big deal of High School graduation at CATM. We have a special Graduate Recognition Sunday where students are celebrated and encouraged by their church family. As a part of this special day, graduates invite their families, close friends, and their "5" to a special meal where they are further celebrated by our whole Student Ministry team. At this meal, graduates share The Plan booklets with their "5" and begin the process of receiving encouragement to thrive as they enter the post-high-school world. This event puts the exclamation point on our preparation of students to be Grounded For Life!

THE GIFT

On Graduate Sunday, students will be presented with special Challenge coins that are custom minted for the SATM graduating class. Challenge coins are a long-standing tradition in the military that serve as a





symbol of identity, a source of pride, and a reminder of the support that life: grounded has behind them. We will give these special gifts to our graduating class to serve as a constant reminder of their identity, values, and the army of support they have behind them in their church family. (Some students put these where they can see them daily and some carry them in their pocket when they are having a tough day.)

Through a special Senior Small Group, the writing of The Plan, the formation of accountability circles, the celebration and commissioning service, the banquet, and a special gift, the Senior Experience serves as not only a celebration, but also a launching pad for High School graduates. By making such a big deal of this important milestone, we encourage families, we further unite students to the church, and we empower students to be Grounded for Life! Our prayer is to give students a purpose, a plan, and the people to help them live God's best for their lives!

We are honored and privileged to be a part of giving them what we believe is a pretty great gift!

DWEEK



Wednesday Night MIDWEEK is a fantastic way to get connected to Students at The Mill! A typical Wednesday Night MIDWEEK includes FREE food (Zaxby's or pizza), hang out time, fun activities, games, and lots of opportunities to meet other students. As fun as our hang-time activities are, the highlight of MIDWEEK is a meaningful time of worship and a relevant message from one of our student pastors that encourages and equips students to discover and live God's best for their lives. ADULT LEADERSHIP

Strong Adult Leaders are the backbone of Students at The Mill. It is vitally important to have leaders who are committed, genuine, and passionate about pouring into students. Our leaders love God, love students, and are excited to help students discover and live God's best for their lives.

There are currently over 60 caring adults serving in the Student Ministry at Church at The Mill. Each adult that works with students has completed a lengthy application process which includes an interview and extensive screening. We are grateful for all the time and effort our adults invest to make sure every student is safe and has a mentor to encourage them in Christ!







We have the most important message ever to share: God loves us so much that He provided a way through Jesus Christ to receive forgiveness of sin, inherit eternal life, and enjoy a personal relationship with Him that begins on earth and lasts through eternity! We are very intentional about how we share this message and how we combat obstacles that might keep anyone from hearing it loud and clear. This is why we place such a high priority on both the PHYSICAL and EMOTIONAL safety of students.

If students don't feel both physically and emotionally safe, it doesn't matter how wonderful the message is or how creatively it's presented, it won't be heard! If parents don't feel like our ministries are safe places, they won't even allow their students to be involved. We work hard to have the reputation that Church at The Mill is a safe environment for everyone. From our weekly programs to our in-town or out-of-town trips and camps, we want to be known as a place where kids and students are physically safe and emotionally secure.

To ensure safety and security in our ministries, we follow a security plan with practices that include:

- A team of security professionals, ministry professionals and reliable adult volunteer leaders
- The use of uniformed and/or plainclothed security personnel
- Regular safety drills to ensure that everyone is prepared in case of emergency
- Policies that serve to protect the physical and emotional well-being of kids, students, and adults
- An electronic check-in process
- An extensive background and screening process for adult volunteer leaders

BRINGING IT HOME

There is a jar that sits in my office that is filled with ping-pong balls, 168 to be exact. That is the number of hours in a week, 165 of the balls are white and 3 are orange. The white balls represent the average number of hours our students spend away from church. These are the hours spent doing the things students do. The three orange balls represent the average number of hours our students spend a week in our Student Ministry programs. (Realizing that while we may offer more, most students don't take advantage of everything offered.)

This jar sits in my office to remind me of two important realities. The first reminder is of iust how little time we will spend with most students each week. This reminds me that our programming must be excellent. Every minute we have with students must count. We cannot afford to do anything halfway. Every time students are with us, they must be encouraged, loved, and challenged.

This also reminds me of the fact that I am not the primary spiritual influence in a student's life. That role still belongs to parents. Like it or not, parents have the awesome responsibility of spiritually training and making disciples of their children. My most important role, then, is to partner with parents and support them in this process. I can offer parents relevant biblical teaching for their students each week. I can offer small group settings for their student to build authentic

relationships with their peers under the mentorship of loving adults. I can offer numerous experiences monthly for their student to learn about and engage in worship, serving, and leadership.

Although our staff works tirelessly to ensure these things are offered with excellence. the impact of such opportunities falls short if the experiences and lessons learned are not directly tied back to the home. In order for these lessons to really "take root," they must be reinforced and practiced at home.

For this to happen effectively, we as a Student Ministry Staff must continue working intentionally to know families and be aware of their needs. Parents must work on continuously being aware of opportunities we offer students, as well as what happens at our programs and events (what is being taught, how students are being challenged, what commitment their students are making, etc.). As we partner and encourage one another, we can truly be teammates in fulfilling the most important responsibility we will ever have.

Such a partnership between a Student Ministry and families can be so effective in offering the best possible opportunities for students to grow in Christ and make a difference for Him. Please know that we are here for you and your family and want to be the best support we can be!

Great Expectations

GROWING ADOLESCENCE

The process of moving from childhood to adulthood in our culture seems to be taking longer and longer. According to Simply Youth Culture Newsletter, "In today's world, the assumption that the adolescent years cease and a teen becomes an adult at the age of 18 is no longer valid. New discoveries regarding the human brain, along with a host of cultural forces, like later marriage, extended college education, massive debt, living at home, and delayed maturity have fueled things like extended adolescence and emerging adulthood..." These terms sound nice, but simply mean that our children are taking longer to grow up. I've even read where some think adolescence extends to the age of 30!

The concept of "adolescence" is a relatively new idea, only about a century old.

A study of the history of "adolescence" certainly lends great insight into the cultural expectations and generational mindset of today's teen culture. Nowhere in pre-twentieth century history books will you find the term "teenager" and nowhere in the Bible exists the idea of adolescence. In ancient Jewish culture, a person was either a "child" or an "adult." (Even today in Judaism, 13 year old boys and 12 year old girls become "Bar or Bat Mitzvah", respectively, and often have a celebration to mark this moving from childhood to adulthood.) The concept of adolescence is widely contributed to psychologist Stanley Hall's 1904 work in which he described a developmental stage he referred to as "adolescence". Child labor laws and school reform laws of the early 1900s more clearly defined this concept culturally, as teens moved from being producers in society to (almost exclusively) consumers. Reader's Digest seemed to solidify the recognition of this new sub-culture when it coined the phrase "teenager."

The past 65 years has seen the evolution of "teenage" years and now "tween" years, that have settled between Childhood and Adulthood. With these new eras, have evolved new cultural expectations. Unfortunately, those expectations seem to be spiraling lower for each successive generation.

Although the need for an era of "adolescence" is well-debated in some fields of study (ie. Psychology), there is no doubt that the concept of adolescence has significantly affected the way society views "teenagers."

EXPECTATIONS

The biggest problem with the evolution of the teenage era and the idea of extended adolescence is the fact that lower and lower expectations appear to be placed on students during "emerging adulthood". While we have students study the lives of such great historical figures as George Washington (land surveyer for state of Virginia at 17, military major at 20) and Thomas Edison (published weekly newspaper at 15, invented light bulb), we often celebrate and reward such things as a made bed or a clean bedroom. We give shiny trophies for participation. There is much data to be read on how our culture has lowered expectations for children/ young adults in the classroom, in the home, and even in the church. As a whole, this generation is known as having an "adolescent mindset." In his work Adolescent Culture - Where Are the Grown Ups?, John Stonestreet suggests that the mark of a culture with a dominant adolescent mindset are precisely what we have come to expect from adolescents themselves. I readily see the six characteristics he lists of our adolescent culture:

- 1. Demand for immediate gratification.
- 2. Absence of long-term thinking about life and the world.
- 3. Motivated by feeling rather than truth.
- 4. Wanting grown-up things without growing up.
- 5. Expecting bailouts rather than accepting consequences.
- 6. Focusing on appearance rather than depth.

Although this adolescent mindset has certainly engulfed our culture, our children do not have to be (and certainly should not be) victims of such a hopelessly situated ideology.

RAISING THE BAR

There is much we can do to raise expectations in our homes and church. We can start by being ever mindful of the following:

1. Root identity in Jesus Christ

Students: Our culture is constantly telling you who you should be, what you should wear, and how you should think. Billions of advertising dollars are spent each year with the purpose of shaping YOUR identity. You can choose to listen to the world, with its constantly changing fads, trends, and ideologies, or you can root your identity in Jesus Christ who "is the same vesterday, today, and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

Parents: The most important thing we can give our children is an identity that is rooted in Jesus Christ. So many parents work so hard to give their children things that will be meaningless in a few years. Training our children to have an identity in Jesus Christ should be THE priority in our homes. There is nothing greater you can do as a parent. What ways are you making spiritual discipleship a priority in your home? How are you fostering a love for and commitment to the church of Jesus Christ?

2. Expect the best

Students: As a follower of Jesus Christ, you have the spirit of the almighty God living in you. Although God does give us the freedom to make our own choices (and face the consequences of bad choices). He wants the very best for us. We should be ever mindful that "I can do all things through Christ who gives me strength." (Philippians 4:13)

Parents: I agree with David Black, who in his book The Myth of Adolescence encourages parents to expect the best, not the worst from their children. "If we expect them to act like irresponsible children, they will," Black states. "On the other hand, if we expect them to act like responsible adults, as people did for thousands of years, they will."

3. Model High Expectations

Students: Raise your own bar. Remember the words of Paul to Timothy. "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." (1 Timothy 4:12) You be the one that encourages and challenges your peers (and your generation) to rebel against low expectations. Don't just meet the expectations your teachers, coaches, and parents have for vou... shatter them and asked that they be raised.

Parents: Change starts with us. We are not accountable for how our society is raising children. We are accountable for how we raise ours. Raising expectations in the home does not always mean being stricter. A far more effective way of raising expectations is modeling great expectations. With students, it really is true that more is "caught" than just "taught."

4. Dream Big

Students: Proverbs 29:18 states, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." So many students kill their future by having no vision, no dreams. Pray, and ask for a Godly vision for your life. When you have a vision, start TODAY to fulfill it. If you don't have a clear vision for you life, put your best effort into staying in close fellowship with Christ (he will never lead you out of His will), and do all you can to prepare yourself spiritually, educationally, and physically for the time you realize that vision. Do all you can, where you are, with what you have, to fulfill what you know is his plan for your life... to make disciples. (Matthew 28:16-20)

Parents: I've heard many students describe their parents as "dream killers." Never forget the power your words have with your children. Even if they are less than impressive in their work ethic and attitude now, God can take less than stellar students, and use them to change the world. Remember the rag-tag bunch of disciples that Jesus chose to start His church? Encourage your children to dream big, and constantly remind them "with God, all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26)

5. Don't fear failure

Students: Fear of failure cripples most students (and adults too) from even trying to fulfill their dreams. However, failure is essential to success. Every time you look at a light bulb, remember that Edison failed 10,000 times before he got it right. Those who give the most to the world won't be stopped by

Parents: So many parents put their primary focus on protecting their children, and lose sight of the goal of preparing them to be disciples of Jesus Christ in this world.

A big part of the preparation is allowing children to learn from failure. If children are never allowed to fail while mom and dad are there helping them learn from it, the lessons will be tougher (and carry more consequences) when parents are not there. Raising expectations, even if our children don't initially meet them, will continue to encourage them to be all God has created them to be.

CONCLUSION

In His last words on earth, Jesus called His followers to be worldchangers. Ever since then, the enemy (Satan) has done all he can to make Jesus-followers think this is impossible. Let's remember who we serve. Let's remember that Jesus told his followers, "I tell you the truth, anyone who has faith in me will do what I have been doing. He will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father." (John 14:12)

Let's remember His words, "From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked." (Luke 12:48b) Jesus has great expectations of us. Do we have great expectations for ourselves?
